# PROJECT BACKGROUND



### WHAT IS THIS PROJECT? WHERE IS IT? WHY?

This project began in May 2022 and focuses on University Drive and 10th Street between 19th Ave N and 13th Ave S. The Fargo-Moorhead Metro Council of Governments, City of Fargo, and NDDOT have partnered to improve University Drive and 10th Street. This corridor is important as a connector in the city, and is in need of safety improvements due to the high numbers of crashes. The project explores elements including new street design and safety improvements for each corridor that will make them better places to live, work, conduct business and commute.

### WHAT HAVE WE LEARNED SO FAR?

Residents, business owners, visitors, employees, students, and other groups all use the corridor and have different needs for traffic and safety. None of the scenarios mitigate every issue and meet every community priority. But, now we know what the pros and cons of different intercentions and how to make improvements the most impactful while still meeting community priorities.

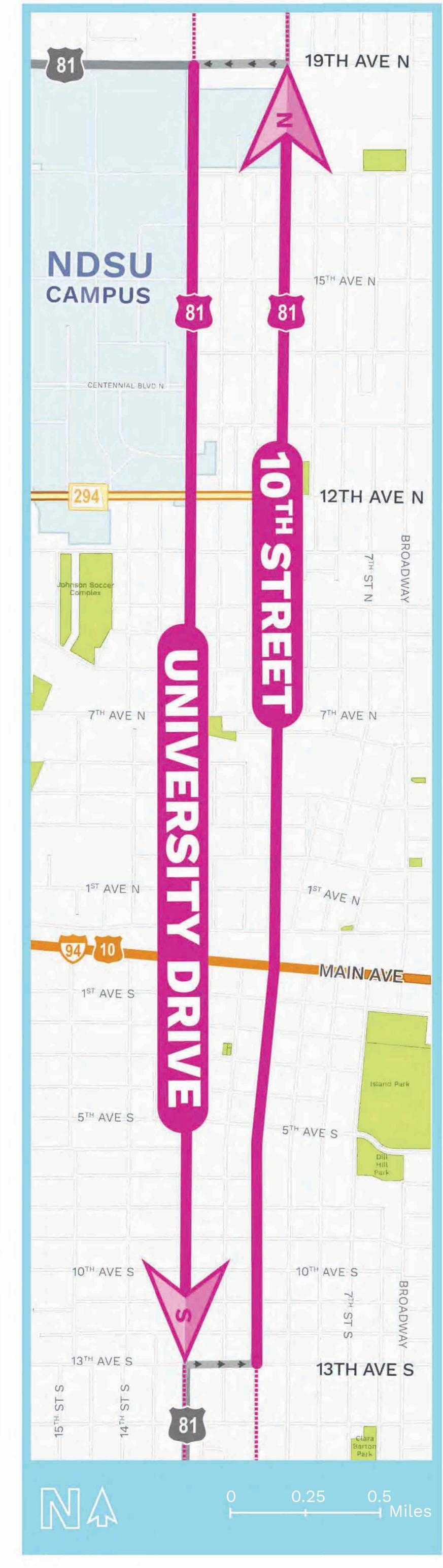
The Final Report contains the information from all of the phases before it, and plots a route for the improvements to be made. This will be available on the MetroCOG website.

# DOWNTOWN RECONFIGURATION

#### **KEY FINDINGS**

- Downtown, where University and 10th each currently expand to 3 lanes, creates confusion and unpredictable driving.
- These areas can carry the same numbers of traffic with only 2 lanes.
- The remaining space can be reused in a variety of ways:
  - Downtown-Only Conversion to Two Way
  - Shared Bike/Walk Path and Turnout Loading Areas Two-way Raised Bikeway
  - One-way Raised Bikeway

# CROSSING SAFETY

#### **KEY FINDINGS**

- University and 10th are busy and difficult to cross
- 3,600 kids enrolled at 9 schools within ½ mile of the corridor
- More than 1,800 bikes are on NDSU campus
- By 2025, University Drive will see more buses an hour than any other corridor in the metro, and people need safe routes to and from bus stops

### RECOMMENDATIONS

• Improve crosswalk lights at existing stoplights, based on the amount of pedestrians, crash history, and daily traffic level









# BICYCLE CONNECTIVITY

### **KEY FINDINGS**

- Railroad underpasses create major barriers where the street narrows and bikes are forced into vehicle traffic
- Remove bicycle facilities from University and 10th in North and South areas; relocate to 11th Street
- Bike facilites Downtown will depend on the alternative selected, and should connect to 11th Street

### RECOMMENDATIONS

- Biking in the North and South project areas should be moved to 11th Street as a Bike Boulevard, with designs for slower car traffic and expectation of sharing the road
- Bike facilites Downtown should connect to 11th Street and other bike lanes and paths







# TRAFFIC CALMING

### **KEY FINDINGS**

- Most common public complaint is fast, unpredictable driving and night-time drag racing
- Majority of traffic is within 5 MPH of the speed limit

### RECOMMENDATIONS

- Time stoplights for 30 MPH speeds; faster traffic will not be able to travel continuously
- Time stoplights to turn green when traffic is slower than the limit and remain red if above the limit
- Narrow extra space on 10th Street North of 17th Ave N by installing curb extensions





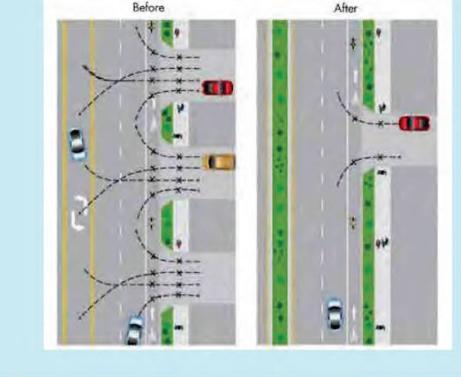
# **CRASH HISTORY**

### **KEY FINDINGS**

- 7 of the top 10 intersections with the most crashes in Fargo
- Corridor has 23% more "angled crashes" than the City average; these crashes tend to be more severe
- 45% of Corridor is above "Critical Crash Rate"

### RECOMMENDATIONS

- Target intersections with highest numbers of crashes to
- receive safety improvements
- · Work with property owners to streamline driveways into one property entrance/exit
- Trim trees to improve driver sightlines, while preserving as many trees as possible. Any trees removed will be replaced.





# EVENT MANAGEMENT

### **KEY FINDINGS**

- Events can be easily accommodated. Compared to everyday traffic operations:
- The roads each have excess capacity • The area has excess parking
- Scheduling is coordination is critical for major events

### RECOMMENDATIONS

- Use digital signs to communicate traffic and parking information with visitors
- Run a shuttle service during events to distribute parking and traffic
- Coordinate major FargoDOME and Convention Center events for different days to reduce event-related congestion

Michael Maddox,

I live at 1122 10<sup>th</sup> St S in Fargo. I moved here in 2019 and I'm so glad I did. I absolutely love the Hawthorne neighborhood – the established trees, beautiful homes and amazing neighbors.

I bought my home with a bit of a "wish list" intact. One of those items was a front porch, which my home has. However, due to the obnoxious racing and exhibition driving past my home, I can't use my front porch for socializing with others. It's not possible to have a conversation there when these drivers go by because it is so incredibly loud.

I saw on the news that beginning this summer, there would be an additional 5 police officers assigned to exhibition driving and noise along 10<sup>th</sup> Street and University Drive. That must not have happened as I have seen no change in the number of individuals racing past my home. I am guessing that this racing and noise has something to do with the proposed project to improve/change 10<sup>th</sup> Street and University Drive.

The individuals who race by my home aren't doing so because 10<sup>th</sup> Street is a one-way. They are racing because they have experienced NO consequences. After spending some time on the website that explains some of the proposed improvements, I saw that one idea is to add a bike lane to the street. This would be a mistake unless the racing/speeding is dealt with.

I am opposed to any plan to widen the street in front of/near my home. The established trees here in the Hawthorne neighborhood are valuable and sought after. I'm also opposed to improvements that would pass the bill on to the homeowners. Things are difficult financially right now for many people. My property taxes have increased every year since I moved here in 2019. My homeowners' insurance has more than doubled.

I am most in favor of your plan to leave 10<sup>th</sup> St and University Drive the same except for the downtown area. It seems to make the most sense and is probably the most financially sensible option. In the end, whichever option is chosen, something must be done about the racing and exhibition driving along the route of 13<sup>th</sup> Avenue S to 10<sup>th</sup> Street to 19<sup>th</sup> Avenue N to University Drive and back around again.

It seems like a simple solution to direct police officers to give extra attention to this activity. The word would get around once several of these individuals received a hefty traffic ticket. This activity needs additional attention for the safety of any individuals along this route, for the safety of the drivers themselves and for those homeowners along the route to be able to enjoy the home they've purchased.

# University & 10<sup>th</sup> St 2-way Conversion Study

Strong Towns Fargo Position Statement 24.11.13

#### **Background**

University and 10<sup>th</sup> St go through seven residential neighborhoods. The traffic has been a concern of the residents who live along and around those two corridors. The concerns have centered on the volume and speed of traffic, causing excess noise, unsafe conditions for bicyclists and pedestrians and deterioration of the housing stock along these two corridors.

The Roosevelt Neighborhood Plan (2004) stated "create a plan to address speeding concerns". The Core Neighborhood Plan (2021) stated that homes along the two streets were 2.5 times more likely to have absentee owners (31%) compared to ownership more than 500 feet from the two corridors (12%). Absentee ownership tends to lead to neglect and deterioration in the housing stock which impacts the property values in the entire neighborhood.

Most of the complaints regarding sleep-disrupting noise occurs in the evening. A speed study was conducted by Strong Towns Fargo during evening hours (9:30pm-11pm) on a recent Friday evening. The average speed measured 38 mph with 82% of the vehicles exceeding the 30mph speed limit. Three vehicles exceeded 50mph, with one traveling at 58mph.

### **Current Study**

The improvements proposed in the current study try to address a few of the concerns. The report focuses on the average speed of the traffic on these corridors. The neighborhood is much more concerned about outliers on that corridor speed bell curve, which are the cause for concern with speeding and noise. The proposal to time the stoplights may provide some relief for speeding. However, that is the only improvement cited.

The proposed designs in this study fail to adequately enhance the safety and usability of bikeways.

Pedestrian safety improvements are managed at the intersections by no right turns on some and delayed green lights for traffic to allow pedestrians a head start.

There are no proposed improvements which will decrease traffic volume.

#### **Position Statement**

Strong Towns Fargo does not believe the improvements suggested in the options do enough. The improvements will have a minimal effect on safety for pedestrians and bicyclists and virtually no impact on residential property concerns.

We believe the only option to significantly improve the conditions on all counts is for a two-way conversion. The neighborhood is asking for a slower speed designed street. There needs to be a better balance between pedestrian/bicycle safety and traffic flow – especially in residential neighborhoods and where children are navigating to schools. Traffic flow has too often been the main driving force for street design. A stronger focus on bicycles and pedestrians needs to be incorporated. The neighborhood has concerns about the car-centric nature of the current streets which is not addressed adequately with the proposal.

Of the four options, only one considers a two-way conversion. We strongly suggest the consultants go back to developing additional two-way options.
