1 Winter 2025 Engagement

Phase 1: Study Formation – Data Gathering

PURPOSE: The first phase of engagement focused on introducing the Railroad Needs Study to the community, sharing data gathering and alternatives development of the identified railroad crossings, and learning about the public's experiences, issues, and opportunities with the railroad crossings. This phase presented educational material to the community and stakeholders on the study, its purpose, and development of alternatives. Additionally, Phase 1 provided an opportunity to learn about the community's experiences with and concerns about safety, bicycle and pedestrian as well as emergency management access, and traffic congestion in relation to these railroad crossings. These insights provide another layer of information pertaining to the existing conditions of the railroad crossings and highlight any hot spots of concerns that might not be identified through data driven reporting. This qualitative information will inform the goals and potential recommendations in the implementation plan.

Frostival Winter Warm Up at the Rourke Event

The Winter Warm Up is part of the Frostival series of events from January 31 – February 8, 2025 across West Fargo, Fargo, and Moorhead. This celebration brings together the metro area communities to enjoy a variety of winter activities. The Winter Warm Up was selected as an established event in the community which draws from 100-175 visitors annually to engage with participants of all ages in the Moorhead community.

Saturday, February 1, 2025 Rourke Art Museum 1:00 – 4:00 p.m.

Event overview:

Get cozy in downtown Moorhead! Fill up at our complimentary cocoa bar after browsing our handmade mug market, gather round the fire pits in the M. Dorian Clemedtson Memorial Sculpture Court, and shop for toasty mittens, hats, and scarves from local fiber artists. Help keep our neighbors warm, too, by dropping off winter weather accessories for our community hat and mitten drive!

Spring-A-Ding-Fling and 67th Annual Kiwanis Pancake Karnival Event

The Spring-A-Ding Fling is a craft and vendor show that features local artists. The 67th Annual Kiwanis Pancake Karnival is a well-established event focused on giving back to the local community. This year, the Pancake Karnival attracted over 6,000 visitors as noted by <u>The Forum of Fargo-Moorhead</u>. Both

events were selected for the second event due to their simultaneous occurrence at the FARGODOME, providing the project team with an opportunity to engage with the significant foot traffic.

The Winter Warm Up, Spring-A-Ding Fling, and 67th Annual Kiwanis Pancake Karnival events were strategically selected to gather public input from both sides of the Red River.

Saturday, February 8, 2025 FARGODOME

Spring-A-Ding-Fling 10 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. 67th Annual Kiwanis Pancake Karnival 7:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m.

Event overview:

Fargo Kiwanis is back at FARGODOME in 2025 for the 67th Annual Pancake Karnival! Serving 7:00 AM - 3:00 PM.

Outreach

The Metro COG promoted these events through a website update on Metro COG's website and social media posts on Metro COG's social media channels. Social media posts occurred closer to the pop-up events on February 1, 2025 and February 8, 2025 to provide regular reminders to the public. Promotions materials for the pop-up events are available in **Attachment A.**

Table Setup




Figure 1: Pop-up event set-up at the Frostival Winter Warm-Up at the Rourke

The booth was set up as shown in **Figure 1** and **Figure 2** and provided a variety of opportunities for input and starting conversations with project staff. Activities included:

- A dot map where attendees could place a sticker indicating priorities for railroad crossing improvements (safety, bicycle and pedestrian access, traffic congestion, and emergency management access).
- Railroad crossing safety coloring sheet for kids with crayons.
- Computer station where attendees could fill out an online survey.
- A floor mat with a wooden train set for kids (at the Winter Warm Up event).

In addition, a handout shared information about the study as well as include a QR code which takes the user to the online survey. At the Winter Warm Up event, a flyer was also available promoting the opportunity to speak with the project team at the FARGODOME at the Spring-A-Ding Fling and 67th Annual Pancake Karnival events. Comment forms were also available. Materials are available in **Attachment B.**

Table Attendance and Interactions

Attendance at the Winter Warm Up was as high as expected, with one-on-one conversations occurring regularly from 1:00 p.m. – 3:00 p.m. on February 1, 2025 (as pictured in **Figure 3**). 19 people signed in, 9 people placed stickers on the dot map, and several took handouts from the booth.

Our table at the FARGODOME was strategically placed to capture foot traffic heading to and from both the

Spring-A-Ding Fling and the 67th Annual Pancake Karnival. Based on estimates from The Forum of Fargo-Moorhead, which anticipates *Figure 3: Pop-up event at the Frostival Winter Warm-Up at the Rourke* over 6,000 visitors by 1 p.m., we estimate that several hundred people passed by our table between 9 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. Approximately 30 people stopped by to talk to staff at Metro COG's table (as

pictured in **Figure 4**). Six people signed in, 12 people placed stickers on the dot map, and several took handouts from the booth. Attendees also interacted with the railroad crossing safety coloring sheet, which also had a QR code to the online engagement summary (as pictured in **Figure 5**).

Between both events, an estimated 60 people visited the booth or participated in some way. Sign-in sheets for both events are available in **Attachment C.**

Staffing

The Winter Warm Up took place from 1:00 p.m. – 4:00 p.m., the Spring-A-Ding Fling ran from 10 a.m. – 4:00 p.m., and the 67th Annual Pancake Karnival was held from 7:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. Staffing was present during the entirety of the Winter Warm Up event and from 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. to capture foot traffic from the Spring-A-Ding Fling and 67th

Annual Pancake Karnival events. The table at each event was attended by consultants from SRF and HDR and Metro COG staff.

Event Takeaways

Overall, the project team engaged in consistent conversations with attendees at both events.

The combined dot maps indicated two red stickers for safety at the Center Street railroad crossing with two blue stickers for bicycle and pedestrian access and one yellow sticker for traffic congestion. The 9th Street crossing received one red sticker for safety and one blue sticker for bicycle and pedestrian access. Regarding Fargo railroad crossings, the 18th Street railroad crossing received five blue stickers for bike

and pedestrian access and one red sticker for safety. The 7th Avenue North, University Drive near 7th Avenue North, and 10th Street near 7th Avenue North railroad crossings each received one blue sticker for bike and pedestrian access. The 7th Avenue North crossing also received one yellow sticker for traffic congestion. Regarding Minnesota railroad crossings, the 14th St & Main railroad crossing received one green sticker for emergency management access. One yellow sticker indicated concern for traffic congestion at the intersection of 19th Avenue and 45th Street and one blue sticker indicated a priority for bicycle and pedestrian access along Main Street near Island Park. Overall, the results show that bike and pedestrian access is the largest priority for community members, followed by safety.

Online Engagement Survey


The public was also invited to respond to a digital survey that was open from February 1, 2025 to July 31, 2025 to provide an alternative participation option which paralleled in-person engagement activities at pop-up events and public meetings held throughout the metro area. The survey questions are outlined in **Attachment D**.

Jotform was used to build the survey online. The project team developed eight questions related to concerns and priorities related to the identified railroad crossings and five optional demographic questions. The survey was promoted through Metro COG's social media channels and website, as well as featured in several local school communications, including the March 6, 2025 *School Talk* newsletter for Fargo Public Schools, a post on the Moorhead Area Public Schools Facebook page on March 12,

2025, and the May 12, 2025 newsletter from West Fargo's Eastwood Elementary School. Examples of outreach are presented in **Attachment E**. The survey received feedback from 106 respondents.


The most frequently mentioned crossing is 14th Street & Main Street in Dilworth, with 43 mentions, indicating significant concern in that area. Other commonly noted locations include 7th Avenue North and 34th Street, with 35 and 30 mentions, respectively. Several crossings in Fargo, such as 10th Street Near 7th Avenue North (28 selections) and University Drive Near 7th Avenue North (26 selections), as well as the 40th Avenue South (23 selections) and 60th Ave S (16 selections) in Moorhead/Clay County were also frequently selected.











































14th Street & Main Street in Dilworth received the highest number of concerns overall, particularly for emergency management access (26 mentions) and traffic congestion (28 mentions). 7th Avenue North, University Drive Near 7th Avenue, and 10th Street near 7th Avenue also ranked high, especially for safety and congestion. Study locations at 34th Street, 19th Avenue North, and 40th Avenue South also showed significant concern, particularly related to safety, bike/pedestrian access, and emergency response delays. Across all of the crossings, safety ranked as the highest concern with 210 selections. Traffic congestion was a close second with 208 selections. Emergency management access ranked third with 160 selections and bike/pedestrian was fourth with 154 selections.

If some of your concerns apply to a specific crossing, please indicate which one(s) and provide any additional details.

Many respondents expressed strong concerns about the 14th Street & Main Street crossing in Dilworth, mentioning it as one of the most problematic locations. This location is near the Burlington Northern and Santa Fe Railway (BNSF) Depot, which is likely why numerous comments noted that trains frequently block the crossing for extended periods, sometimes 30 minutes or longer, due to crew


changes, switching operations, or stationary trains. Respondents described significant impacts, including limited emergency access, detours onto poorly maintained gravel roads, and general delays for everyday travel and deliveries. Several stated that the crossing is impassable "90% of the time," which pushes local traffic into neighboring communities.

Other comments mentioned lack of bike and pedestrian accommodations, need for better signage or warnings (particularly at 7th Avenue North), and requests for grade elevation or improvements at the 9th Street and Center Street crossings in West Fargo. Overall, the recurring themes were extended train blockages, limited mobility, and inadequate infrastructure for bicyclists and pedestrians.

Are there any areas you feel we have not addressed regarding your concerns with these crossings?

A recurring theme across responses was the physical condition of crossings, with mentions of poor maintenance such as at 8th Street North near downtown Moorhead, where repairs are needed. A few respondents also stressed the need for overpasses or underpasses to alleviate persistent congestion and long train delays, particularly in Fargo, Moorhead, and Dilworth.

Some comments reflected ongoing frustration with a lack of action, citing that while concerns have been raised before, no follow-through has occurred. Others expressed worries about frequent train blockages, excessive noise from train whistles, and fast train speeds, especially near residential areas. One respondent advocated for implementing a quiet zone near 34th Street in Moorhead.



What are your primary areas of concern regarding railroad crossings? Select all that apply.


When asked to identify primary concerns about railroad crossings overall, respondents' selections closely aligned with concerns noted for specific locations. Safety and traffic congestion were the most frequently selected issues, each receiving 57 responses. Emergency management access followed with 41 selections, and bike/pedestrian access received 37.

Are there any additional aspects of railroad crossings that you believe should be studied or considered for improvement that have not been mentioned in this survey?

Several responses emphasized the need for grade-separated crossings (overpasses or underpasses), particularly at 14th Street & Main Street in Dilworth, likely due to the crossing's proximity to the BNSF Depot. These improvements can help reduce delays and support emergency access to neighborhoods like "Little Italy." Several participants also suggested broader infrastructure changes such as rerouting trains around the metro area, implementing a rail loop, or developing light and commuter rail systems to minimize urban freight traffic.


Other comments highlighted accessibility issues for individuals using mobility devices, the impact of train noise, and the need for better pedestrian infrastructure in downtown Moorhead. A few respondents noted specific safety and traffic hazards, including dangerous turning conditions at 34th Street in Moorhead and unnecessary red light delays when train arms are down. While a couple of respondents expressed minimal concern with current crossings, the majority called for more proactive and long-term transportation planning to reduce congestion and improve safety across the metro.

Where do you reside?




Out of a total of 104 responses, the majority reported living in either Fargo (32) or Moorhead (32). Dilworth followed closely with 25 residents, eight responses came from West Fargo (8), and five respondents preferred not to answer.

What is your age?




The majority of survey respondents fall within the 26–45 age group (49 respondents). This is followed by the 46–65 age group (33 respondents). Seniors (65+) accounted for 11 responses, while young adults aged 18–25 made up 5 responses. No respondents were 17 or younger, and seven chose not to disclose their age.

What gender do you identify with?




The survey respondents were evenly split between male and female, with 48 participants each. Additionally, eight respondents preferred not to disclose their gender, and one identified as non-binary.

What race/ethnicity best describes you?




The vast majority of respondents identified as White or Caucasian (95), with a small number identifying as Two or More Races (2), Hispanic or Latino/Latina (1), and Mediterranean (1). Additionally, six participants preferred not to disclose their race or ethnicity. While "Mediterranean" is not a recognized category in the U.S. Census for race or ethnicity, it was self-reported under the "Other" option.



What is your highest level of education completed?

Most respondents have a Bachelor's degree (42), followed by those with a Master's degree (23). Others reported some college without a degree (14), high school diploma or equivalent (7), associate degree (3), doctorate degree (4), and professional degrees such as MD or JD (3). Additionally, nine participants preferred not to answer.



What language is most frequently spoken in your home?

101 respondents indicated that they speak English and three preferred not to answer.

2 Summer 2025 Engagement

Phase 2: Alternatives Development & Further Analysis

PURPOSE: The second phase of engagement focused on sharing alternatives development for public feedback with key jurisdictions.

Public Meetings Overview

Four public input meetings were held, one in each key jurisdiction, from 5 to 7 p.m. The schedule was as follows: July 1, 2025, at the Rustad Recreation Center; July 8, 2025, at the Fargo Public Library; July 10, 2025, at the Hjemkomst Center; and July 14, 2025, at the Dilworth Depot Building.

Attendees were first welcomed by signage and then greeted by HDR staff at the welcome/sign-in table inside (as pictured in **Figures 6** and **7**). The table featured a sign-in sheet, an informational handout outlining the project, and a comment form. Refreshments, including water and cookies, were available inside the event space.

Attendees had the opportunity to review alternatives to improve the identified railroad crossings, learn about the proposed assessment criteria of these alternatives, and get more information about the project timeline and its next steps. General comments, both verbal and written, were also encouraged

and recorded. Metro COG and HDR staff were available for the duration of each public input meeting to interact with area residents and other stakeholders (as pictured in **Figure 8**).




Figure 7: Set-up at Dilworth public input meeting

Outreach

The following outreach materials were used to promote the public input meeting. Copies of the materials are available in **Attachment F.**

- Publication: Public Notices were published in The Forum of Fargo-Moorhead on June 23, June 30, July 2, and July 3, 2025.
- Postcard: Impacted property owners within a 1,000-foot radius were mailed postcards inviting them to the public input meetings. On June 24, 2025, 90 postcards were sent to landowners in West Fargo. On June 27, 2025, 336 postcards were distributed to landowners in Fargo, and 66 postcards were sent to landowners in Moorhead and Clay County. Finally, on July 2, 2025, 209 postcards were mailed to landowners in Dilworth.
- Fivers: Fivers promoting the public input meetings were distributed at community locations such as gas stations, grocery stores, and public libraries located near the identified railroad crossings.
- Press releases: Press releases were published in *The Forum of Fargo-Moorhead* on June 24 and July 1, 2025.
- Website: Date, time, and location information about the public input meetings was posted on the project page on Metro COG's

Recorded Comments

Attendees were encouraged to leave written comments during each public input meeting using a comment form that could be turned in at the event or sent in later via postal mail. Seven written comments were collected at the Comment Station. Copies of the completed comment forms are available in **Attachment I**. Project staff also recorded comments during their conversations. Table 1 identifies the key themes and inquiries.

Key Themes and Inquires

No comments were received about the West Fargo crossings during the comment period for this public input meeting, which was from July 1 to July 18, 2025.

At the Fargo public meeting, one attendee generally favored pedestrian improvements over vehicular ones. He supported the 18th Street pedestrian crossing as it provides safer access where few crossings currently exist. Similarly, the 19th Avenue North pedestrian path was appreciated for addressing the lack of east-west pedestrian connections, especially near the airport where sidewalks are limited.

However, he raised concerns about proposals to potentially increase bridge clearance near University Drive and 10th Street, mainly due to potential increases in truck traffic that could disrupt residential neighborhoods and raise safety and noise issues. The attendee worried that if these bridges don't currently restrict trucks, upgrades might be unnecessary, especially if BNSF isn't contributing financially. The 7th Ave North crossing was noted for frequent traffic backups, but no clear preference was expressed regarding proposed solutions. Another attendee noted that the skewed crossing at 7th Ave North can catch the wheels of bikes and wheelchairs and that the perpendicular pedestrian crossing would be safer for non-motorists. Overall, the preference was for enhancements that promote walking and biking rather than increased truck access through residential areas.

At the Moorhead public meeting, an attendee shared that the Dilworth US Highway 10 project has been postponed until 2031, but a temporary signal will be installed at the Dilworth retail area frontage road access to Highway 10 before then. Another attendee mentioned that, except for 15th Street, all study locations in West Fargo are important, noting challenges related to property development and surrounding land use at the 15th Street site.

At the Dilworth public meeting, an attendee highlighted strong community support for grade separation at 14th Street, while another attendee noted that a new sustainable aviation fuel facility east of the 40th Avenue crossing in Moorhead could increase truck traffic in the area. Another attendee noted that a 14th Street E overpass is "critical" to the city's development and suggested combining this improvement with the Highway 10 improvements and roundabout construction. Feedback on 34th Street was positive, with one resident appreciating the potential to reduce heavy traffic on Highway 10 by providing better access to local businesses. However, there was notable opposition to changes at Main and 14th Street from a neighborhood resident concerned about longer travel distances, farmland acquisition, and skepticism about the need for change after decades of discussion.

A submitted comment from a long-time Dilworth resident expressed frustration over frequent 20-30 minute train delays at the Main Street crossing, emphasizing its importance for study over other crossings in the area. Overall, the 14th and Main crossing remains the community's focal point due to ongoing train delays and local impact.

WEST FARGO — The Fargo-Moorhead Metropolitan Council of Governments is seeking feedback on proposed railroad crossing improvements.

Metro COG is hosting a public input meeting for its Metro Railroad Needs Study from 5-7 p.m. on Tuesday, July 1. According to a press release from Metro COG, the meeting will be held in the Pioneer Room on the first floor of the Rustad Recreation Center, 601 26th Ave., West Fargo.

According to the press release, Metro COG has identified key railroad crossings in the Fargo-Moorhead area for the study, with a goal of identifying improvements for the crossings and providing recommendations on funding and implementing the changes. At the open house, attendees will have an opportunity to review different improvement alternatives, share feedback and receive more information about the next steps.



Group wants public input on improving metro railroad crossings

WEST FARGO — The future of railroad crossings in the metro are already being planned.

Years before any shovel hits the ground, there is loads of work going on behind the scenes, according to Ben Griffith, executive director of Metropolitan Council of Governments (Metro COG) (https://www.fmmetrocog.org/).

In order to set priorities for the next decade or so, Metro COG gathered all the local governments in the area and, in collaboration with BNSF, made a list of all area railroad crossings needing work.

"It's really good that we have jurisdictions that work so well together and see the big picture," Griffith said.

This Metro COG study is a collaboration between the cities of West Fargo, Fargo, Moorhead and Dilworth as well as Cass and Clay counties.

Now, Griffith's team turns to the public for help.

Residents are being asked to lend ideas and input to the railroad improvement study in order to help determine which projects are prioritized, Griffith said.

At an open house in West Fargo on Tuesday, July 1, Griffith and the study's contractor, HDR Engineering, were on hand to answer questions and gather feedback. It is the first of four such events planned this month.

"The 15 locations included in the study were identified by local jurisdictions as prime candidates for functional improvements or areas with aging infrastructure," according to Dan Bergerson, an engineer with HDR.

Once completed, this study will give local governments a guideline on which projects to prioritize and what federal funding sources are available.

Proposed improvements considered range from realigning roadways to building a new way for pedestrians to cross the railroad, such as weighing the merits of either an overpass or underpass across the tracks at 18th Street South and Main Avenue, by Brewhalla in Fargo.

"Some improvements could be 15 years or more from construction, if they continue to move forward," Bergerson said.

In the planning phase, however, it's "really helpful" to gain a "local insider perspective" to determine which projects are most important to the public, said Mary McCall, communications coordinator with HDR.

The public can provide information about traffic and safety concerns at each study location, she said, including proximity to schools, the visibility of lights and signs, how accessible it is to bicyclists and pedestrians and whether or not traffic congestion is an issue.

In total, the study looks at five proposed locations in West Fargo, five in Fargo, three in Moorhead and two in Dilworth.

Metro COG is hosting three more public input sessions this July:

The next one is 5 to 7 p.m. on Tuesday, July 8, in the Community Room at the Fargo Public Library, at 101 Fourth St. N., Fargo. Metro COG and HDR will be in Moorhead, 5 to 7 p.m. on Thursday, July 10, for a public input meeting in the Oak Room at the Hjemkomst Center, at 202 First Ave. N.

The final session will be 5 to 7 p.m. on Monday, July 14, at the Dilworth City Depot, located in Whistle Stop Park, 3 Fourth St. NE.

Public input also will be accepted online, McCall said, until July 31.

At that point her team will write up all the input and study the trends from the public's feedback.

That report will be given to the Study Review Committee — composed of engineers from each local government, the North Dakota Department of Transportation and BNSF — and the Stakeholder Committee, made up of local first responders, MATBUS representatives and school officials.

The final report will come by the end of 2025, she said, and Metro COG will keep that on hand for local governments to reference as they work on railroad intersection projects going forward.

Project Prioritization & Evaluation Process

How are project alternatives being evaluated?

The project team evaluated each crossing location to identify priorities, determine potential improvements, and, where appropriate, narrow alternatives to the top two options.

To support this process, a Multiple Account Evaluation (MAE) was used alongside a Cost-Benefit Analysis. The MAE helps incorporate local considerations that aren't always captured in traditional cost-benefit models, but are important to communities and decision-makers.

A survey was distributed to both the Study Review Committee (SRC) and the Stakeholder Committee to rank the importance of the evaluation factors. The results below will inform a scoring matrix to evaluate project alternatives.



Magnitude of Project Benefits	Measures the size of scala, economic benefits such as crash reduction, included travel, and liding time. Alternatives with greater benefits score higher.
Magnitude of Project Costs	Total copiral costs for an alternative. Low-cost alternatives score higher.
Emergency Service Access	Assesses how well a proposed alternative improves access for emergency vehicles. Greater improvements scare better.
Railroad Support	Gouges the level of support from the regional rail provider for each alternative.
Train Traffic	Considers how much train activity occurs at each location, improvements to high traffic crossings may affer greater benefits
Discretionary Funding Potential	Evaluates how competitive the project is far federal grant funding, considering readiness, local match, safety, and other key elements.
Multimodal Mobility & Active Transportation	Measures potential to support walking, biking, and other non-vehicular travel modes in the orea, promoting regional multimodal transportation options.
Community Impacts	Considers impacts such as noise reduction, improved occess to trainesses and homes, surrounding population density, and community support.
School Bus Traffic	Evaluates the presence of school bus activity and appartunities to enhance sofiety by reducing railroad – school bus interactions.

Public Comment received by Ben Griffith via phone from Doug Fiandaca (218-287-2970) a resident of Dilworth, MN on Monday, July 14, 2025.

Mr. Fiandaca called on the afternoon of Monday, July 14, 2025, in response to a post card sent to his home announcing a public meeting at the Dilworth City Depot later that evening from 5:00-7:00.

Mr. Fiandaca had some general questions about the study and wanted to make sure it included the railroad crossing at 14th and Main in Dilworth. He stated that he lived south of the intersection and that because of switching trains in the rail yard, there were terrible delays of 20-30 minutes or more, blocking the intersection. Mr. Fiandaca added that he had lived in Dilworth his entire life and had spent half of it waiting on trains!

When asked about the other railroad crossings in the Dilworth area, Mr. Fiandaca replied that they should probably be studied too, but the focus should be the crossing at $14^{\rm th}$ and Main.
