3b. Moorhead 12th Avenue South Corridor Study Final Report

Matt Kinsella, of Apex Engineering gave a presentation regarding the Moorhead 12th Avenue South Corridor Study Final Report. Ms. Mongeau asked about collaboration with Concordia College. Mr. Kinsella said they have been in coordination with the college and have been proposing access management solutions for the campus.

Mr. Hendrickson asked about the railroad crossing and if it would be feasible to include in the 2020 project. Mr. Kinsella that the railroad solution would be a much longer term project requiring lengthy coordination with BNSF.

Ms. Mattson asked about the intersection of 8th Street and 12th Avenue South and the "no right turn on red" in the eastbound to southbound direction. Mr. Kinsella said that the decision was made to make them dynamic signs rather than permanent, as they have been proven to be more effective than static signs.

This amendment is by and between the State of Minnesota, through its Commissioner of Transportation ("State") and Fargo-Moorhead Metropolitan Council of Governments, Case Plaza, Suite 232, One Street North, Fargo, ND 58102-4807 acting through its Policy Board ("Governmental Unit").

RECITALS

- 1. State has a contract with the Governmental Unit identified as MnDOT Contract Number 1030763 ("Original Contract"). State is in need of planning services to complete an alternative analysis for US 10 and 75, including a railroad underpass in Moorhead.
- 2. It is necessary to amend the contract to gather additional stakeholder input and due to staffing changes.
- 3. State and the Governmental Unit are willing to amend the Original Contract as stated below.

CONTRACT AMENDMENT

Unless otherwise noted, in this amendment, deleted contract terms will be struck out and the added contract terms will be **bolded** and <u>underlined</u>.

REVISION 1. Subarticle 1.2 is amended as follows:

1.2 Expiration Date: This agreement will expire on June 30, 2019 June 30, 2020 or when all obligations have been satisfactorily fulfilled, whichever comes first.

REVISION 2. Exhibit A Scope of Services – Timeline is amended as follows:

It is expected that the above referenced study process will begin in June 2018 <u>and</u> will be completed no later than June <u>30, 2019 2020</u>.

The Original Contract and any previous amendments are incorporated into this amendment by reference. Except as amended herein, the terms and conditions of the Original Contract and any previous amendment remain in full force and effect.

RE: FY 2020 Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development Grant Program Moorhead Grade Separation, Safety, and Mobility Project

Dear Secretary Chao:

The Fargo-Moorhead Metropolitan Council of Governments (Metro COG) is in support of the Moorhead Grade Separation, Safety and Mobility Project. This project would provide the much needed railroad grade separations at 11th St in the core of Moorhead, MN.

Metro COG is currently in the process of updating the Metropolitan Transportation Plan for the metro area. Numerous projects have been scored and ranked as part of that effort. The 11th Street railroad grade separation scores high in our project prioritization due largely to the improved system security, resiliency, and reliability that would result from a grade separation at this location. The prioritization also recognizes that the grade separation provides a connection to jobs, improves freight connections, and provides improved mobility on a commercial arterial corridor. The draft planning products for the 2045 MTP build upon the adopted 2040 Long Range Transportation Plan (2014) and the Moorhead Downtown Grade Separation Study (2016), both of which documented the importance of a railroad grade separation.

Asignificant number of trainstravel through Moorhead daily, however all crossings through the core of the City are currently at-grade. The lack of grade separations has a significant impact on the mobility of local traffic, regional traffic, freight movement, bicycle/pedestrian movement, and emergency response. The funding of this project would greatly alleviate these deficiencies and would provide the safety and mobility necessary for our quickly-growing region.

The need for this project has been in the forefront of our Metropolitan Area's transportation priorities for decades and has only increased in importance as both vehicular and rail traffic continue to increase.

We look forward to the benefits that these grade separations will have on the safety and mobility of our Metropolitan Area and our region.

Re: 2020 Budget and 2019-2020 UPWP Amendment #3 - 2020 Updates

Background

The 2019-2020 UPWP was approved by FHWA in December of 2018. In February, 2019, UPWP Amendment #1 was approved to adjust project budgets for the 9th Street Corridor Study and the Northwest Metropolitan Transportation Plan. Amendment #1 was an administrative modification. In March, 2019, UPWP Amendment #2 was prepared to add the 17th Avenue S Corridor Study as a carryover project into the 2019-2020 UPWP, and to add funds to the 2019 Operations/Overhead Budget to purchase updated traffic count equipment.

Proposed UPWP Amendment #3

The purpose of UPWP Amendment #3 is to update the 2020 budget and contracted projects. At the May TTC and Policy Board meeting, there was general agreement that a Veterans Boulevard Corridor Feasibility Analysis is an acceptable 2020 substitute for the Metro wide Traffic Counting Program, which will be reprogrammed for 2021.

Remove Metro COG Traffic Counting Program – Reschedule in 2021-2022 UPWP as a 2021 Project

Moving this project to 2021 allows it to occur during the same year as NDDOT is scheduled to complete counts in eastern ND. Local match was broken out between all jurisdictions.

Please keep in mind that Metro COG has the equipment and the capability to carry out traffic counts using tubes or cameras within the metropolitan planning area as the need arises.

Add Veterans Boulevard Corridor Feasibility Study – <u>Use funds designated for traffic counting program on this study in 2020</u>

This study was submitted by the City of Fargo for the list of future studies and plans needed in the metropolitan planning area. At this time, the 2020 budget reflects this as a \$125,000 project, which is the same budget as the traffic counting program. Metro COG has the flexibility to add federal funds to this project, which would increase the local match requirement. TTC recommended the addition of \$25,000 to this project, bringing the total to \$150,000 consisting of \$120,000 Federal funds and \$30,000 local funds (80/20 split).

Operations and Overhead – <u>Adjustments to operations and overhead costs</u>

Metro COG will be taking on additional square footage within the Case building. That, along with our lease arrangements, as approved upon by the Policy Board, will result in increased rent. Other operational costs have been adjusted based on salary updates, payment of professional organization dues, software and other IT-related needs, the need for additional travel budget, and additional, more recent information.

CPG Funds – Remaining CPG funds of \$168,591

Based on budgeted amounts thus far, Metro COG has approximately \$168,000 remaining in unbudgeted CPG funds for 2020. Options for those funds were presented to the TTC. They include:

- Dynamic Traffic Assignment Coordination with ATAC or another entity,
- StreetLight platform purchase registration to enable use of data paid for by MNDOT (\$5,000),
- Add funds to the Veterans Boulevard Corridor Feasibility Study (\$25,000),
- Add funds to another project already under contract, if needed (76th Ave S),
- Add budget to ATAC's Intersection Traffic Data Reporting project for Fargo, West Fargo and Moorhead,
- Add the proposed ATSPM set-up for Fargo as proposed by ATAC, and
- Designate project in 2020 when priorities become more apparent.

It is not necessary to program all of the remaining Federal funds. The use of all or a portion of these funds will require a 20 percent local match. A twenty percent match for the entire CPG amount of \$168,591 is \$42,147, for a total of \$210,738. The TTC recommended programming approximately \$92,000 in additional Federal Funds, leaving approximately \$76,500 to address other needs that may arise during 2020. The local match for the programming of an additional \$92,000 is \$23,000.

Summary

The proposed budget results in changes to the local match amounts for Metro COG's partner jurisdictions. At their June 5^{th} meeting the Executive Committee reviewed the proposed changes both in total and in the form of a detailed breakout of costs and recommended approval to the Policy Board. TTC recommended approval at their June 14^{th} meeting. The changes are summarized in Table 1.

Operations and overhead changes are necessary to reflect changes in several areas, including, but not limited to an increase in Metro COG's rent as a result of absorbing more square footage, staff salary adjustments, professional organization dues payment (approved by Policy Board in 2019), and the observation that the budget in the approved UPWP does not adequately account for local and regional travel costs. In addition, many opportunities have arisen for FHWA and FTA workshops and training that are not accounted for in our travel budget. We believe it is important that we have the ability to send a staff person to these events to ensure that we are following the most up-to-date Federal guidance. The Policy Board has also encouraged Metro COG to become more involved locally and regionally in events and meetings that require registration and travel.

Table 2 breaks out the proposed overhead budget categories. Some of the categories are not apples-to-apples comparisons, as certain costs were moved from one category to another.

Re: ND Urban Transportation Alternatives Grant Results

In December 2018 Metro COG submitted the Transportation Alternatives (TA) program grant applications to NDDOT for award consideration. Metro COG received a total of ten applications – five from City of Fargo, three from City of West Fargo, one from City of Horace, and one from Fargo Public Schools.

A total of seven projects were awarded (see Attachment 1 – Urban Projects – 2020/2021 Transportation Alternatives (TA). The West Fargo Drain 45 Multi-Use Path (Phase 1) was selected for funding as the 7th ranked project overall.

Metro COG, in cooperation with the Metropolitan Bicycle & Pedestrian Committee, prioritized the applications prior to submittal to NDDOT. This process of Metro COG prioritizing applications takes place each solicitation year.

Projects are awarded funding based on the decision of NDDOT's Transportation Alternatives Project Selection Committee. Historically, the project prioritizations submitted by Metro COG tend to align with the prioritization of the NDDOT's Selection Committee. However the last round of award funding showed differing prioritizations between NDDOT's Selection Committee and the prioritizations submitted by Metro COG. The differing prioritizations can be seen below:

Re: Fargo-Moorhead Bike Map App

In an effort to make the bike facilities in the Fargo-Moorhead area more accessible, Metro COG hired My City Bikes to develop a mobile map application (app). This appreplaces the printed Bike Maps that were previously distributed throughout the region. Staff and the Metropolitan Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee believe this new app will increase the usability and accessibility of the bicycle facility network throughout the area.

An additional benefit of the app is the ability to update the map's facilities frequently. As often as monthly, Metro COG staff can submit information to My City Bikes to update the bicycle network.

To make the public aware of the switch to an online and mobile map, staff has developed promotional material. Informational flyers and business cards with the Fargo-Moorhead Bike Map App logo, download links, and QR code have been developed and will be distributed throughout the region where the 2017 Bike Maps were previously placed. Prototypes of these promotional materials are attached.

At Streets Alive on June 23rd, 2019 and August 25th, 2019, Metro COG staff will also hand out the brochures, business cards, and water bottles with labels containing the website and app information.

As of, June 6, 2019, the Fargo-Moorhead Bike Map App is live on Metro COG's website at www.fmmetrocog.org/fmbikemap. On the website there are links to download the app onto an individual's mobile device. The App is currently available for download on Google Play for Android users. Later this month, it will be available for download onto Apple devices from the App Store.

A unique feature that will go live later this month in both apps is that users can allow the app to use their location to identify nearby bike facilities, which can help guide them throughout the network. The app also incorporates Google Streetview for easier navigational purposes.

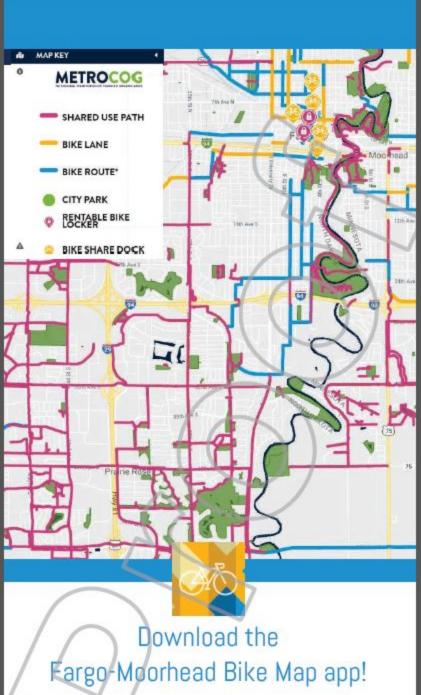
Fargo-Moorhead Bike Map
